A report from children on Aland to the UN

Introduction

Every five years Finland submits a report to the UN regarding the lives of children here.

Then the UN works out a list of things that must be done, so that children in Finland will be better off.

The UN do not only want to know the opinions of the adults, but they also want to know what children (everyone under the age of 18) think it is like growing up in Finland and on the Åland Islands.

During the summer of 2020 Save the Children's summer workers, "Child Convention Pilots" (14-17 years) started to write a report of their own to the UN. The pilots have included information from various projects that they worked on during the summer and have prepared surveys for Åland children. The pilots and children who are part of Save the Children on Åland's board have continued to work with the children's report to the UN after the summer.

The report has been translated into English and submitted to the UN Committe on the Rights of the Child.

Why did we choose to work with precisely this?

We have chosen to work with this to try to achieve the goal of a better society for young people. We had the freedom to choose the projects we were interested in.

Tips for adults:

Here are many important themes and recommendations from children of different ages!

In particular, take a look at the sections that concern yourself, such as school, leisure activities, listening to children, immigrant children, and children with separated parents!





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1. Survey completed by Åland Islands children

To get opinions from other children and young people, we, children who are active in Save the Children, conducted a survey that everyone under the age of 18 had the opportunity to answer.

In total, we received 355 responses from children aged 6-17 years. We had asked, among other things, if the children themselves were allowed to decide, what would they do to make Åland a better place for children and young people. Recurring answers to that question were, among other things, that no one should be exposed to bullying, that everyone should have access to leisure activities and that all children should be able to afford to feel good.

We also asked if they had knowledge of the Convention on the Rights of the Child before. 18% answered that they didn't; the vast majority of these are in years 1-3 in elementary school.


Of course, we would have liked to have seen that everyone answered yes, but that 82% already knew about the Convention on the Rights of the Child are still a very good number. Since it is so important that children and young people know their rights, we hope that more time will be spent on the Convention on the Rights of the Child in schools. Only 24% of those who responded to the survey think that it is talked about enough in school.

Here we have collected all the answers from the survey. All answers are direct quotes from the survey, we have not edited them. Only totally identical answers have been removed as we believe it is due to technical errors. We also removed some answers that could be interpreted as offensive.





How old are you?




What kind of school do you attend?

355 children answered this question.




What is your gender?

All schoolwork should be done at school and not at home.

Many young people (middle school) are very stressed and feel bad mentally, all because of school. After being at school for 6 hours I can promise you that you are tired and just want to go home and take it easy and then maybe do your leisure activity. But no, after school you must start with homework.Yes, okay if they were like two, but when you have different teachers in all subjects and everyone gives homework in their subject, you can have homework in 5 subjects every day. I think school should take place in school and not in my spare time. Instead of 6 hours of school, it will be 7-8 depending on how much time and energy you spend on your grades. It gets to be even worse when you must sit and study for tests. Two tests a week for many weeks is very stressful and it doesn't feel good to skip studying and performing very well because most teachers only consider what you get in tests and oral guizzes. I think we should be assessed more on what we do in class, oral activity, presentations and other than written tests. Too many kids cannot perform their best during tests because they become so nervous or prefer to talk than write down what they know. It seems that we have more homework and tests at (one of the middle schools). I have that from those I talk to in the other schools. My friends at (another middle school) have much less homework than me. (MY SCHOOL) MUST change its view on homework and tests!

When adults come home from work are very tired and do not feel like doing anything at all. Young people as us are at least as tired and have had an equally difficult day at school. But when we come home from school, unlike adults, we have to do homework and study. After school you are too tired to do homework and therefore you have to do that late in the evening which leads to you going to bed late. Most people sleep too little and almost fall asleep at school.

Those in school also do not know what happens outside of school in one's life. You may not have a good situation at home, have bad relationships, feel bad about your body, parents who are alcoholics or are depressed. When you are at home you must do homework and so much else is going on in a young person's life at the same time, such as keeping up on social media. It is not easy to catch up with everything without starting to feel bad or get really stressed.

School would benefit from having less homework. I'm not saying that you should stop having homework altogether, but that you reduce it. Tests as well. Instead of tests, you can have more oral exercises in class, presentations, writing projects, pair exercises and quizzes.

Many more than adults think feel bad about themselves and their appearance. Many more than you know about have eating disorders. Almost all the girls I know cry every night without anyone knowing about them.

I know I'm not the only one who thinks this. I know they are many, many more. I have talked a lot with my friends from mine and other schools and they think the same.




Have you heard of the Convention on the Rights of the Child and children's rights before?

310 children replied to this question. All were allowed to choose several alternatives.




61 children replied that they had not heard of the Convention on the Rights of the Child before:



344 children replied to this question.




Children's participation

344 children replied to this question.






90% of children who know that adults should listen to children have found out about it in school.




Children's participation

254 children replied to this question. Everyone was allowed to write free text.




A few open answers:

352 children replied to this question. Everyone was allowed to choose several alternatives and determine themselves what it is that bullying is.




Other:

How many girls, boys and immigrant children have been bullied?


170 girls answered the question and 51 of them answered that they had been bullied. 162 boys answered the question and 46 of them answered that they had been bullied. 64 children who have moved to Åland answered the question and 30 of them answered that they had been bullied.



Bullying and racism

Have you experienced racism on Åland?

342 children replied to this question. Everyone could choose several options and decide for themselves whether someone behaved in a racist way.

What can the school, parents and other adults do to make you feel safe?

- Talk to me about what has happened at school and then say what I should do the next day when the bully comes and tries to bully me
- If you e.g. bullied, you should talk to an adult or someone close to you, and then that person can talk to the principal or the teacher and bring up with this person who is being bullied
- When I was bullied in the first and second grade, I told my teacher and she took and talked to me and the girl who bullied me and she finally stopped. At home, my parents have said that it is absolutely not okay to bully, and they comforted me when I was bullied
- Reduce homework in school. Adults who listen if you want to talk certain things or talk about a friend or so
- They can show it. They can check how it is with someone if they see that you feel bad or are treated badly. The adults in the school could sit down with the students individually and just talk to it. Just so that you feel that you have an adult you trust. That you have someone you can turn to when you cannot talk to your parents.
- You can find other groups in order not to hang out with the bully



- A few more stores
- More activities and more fun things for children
- A playland
- That there are more bicycles and walkways that you repaint the pedestrian crossings in the countryside
- I think that Åland would need more playgrounds so that children are close to play
- That there are more fun parks.
- It is already the best place to live in the world, , but you could make more playgrounds

2. Immigrant children on Åland


Introduction

30.6.2020 we organised a youth café for immigrant children. Everything went super well! We had decorated nicely, and we had arranged multicultural coffee. People came from different countries.

To begin with, everyone got to introduce themselves. After that we had prepared a PowerPoint with questions that we all answered. The discussions were interesting and long! We also had a game where we chose 10 rights / articles from the Convention on the Rights of the Child and they had to make a pyramid in small groups and choose which right Åland is best to follow = at the top, and then the bottom = articles that Åland may not be so good at following!

Then we continued with our questions and discussed more. Everyone got to tell a little about their lives, how they miss their homeland and what it is like to live on Åland. We also talked about how rights are followed and how it is for immigrants in school / at work and how it feels. We also noticed that there is a difference in age, as to how they learn Swedish and the difference between living in Sweden or living on Åland.

We had a person who documented the discussion, here are the notes.



What is it like to be a child who has moved to Aland?

The people who participated in the youth coffee, expressed their views on what it was like to be a newcomer.

Here's what they said:

- "It was shocking"
- "Har to get used to a small town/so few people"
- "Hard to learn the language"
- "I was afraid to make mistakes when I talked"
- "Some people laugh / tease you, and you cannot defend yourself because you do not know the language"

What can be done to make it better for all children who have moved to Åland?

We thought it would have been good if there were camps for immigrant children, more shops, more people and more activities just for us, so that we have somewhere where we can feel a sense of belonging.

Since Åland is so small rumours spread quickly. There are also very few people who have moved here so that when you arrive here you immediately feel the xenophobia, i.e. unpleasant glances. It's probably because people who were born here aren't used to people from other countries living here.





We had selected 10 rights. The task was to rank the rights based on which Åland follows best (and in this way bring about discussion).

• Four groups worked, and the different pyramids are pictured. The right that the group thinks Åland follows best is at the top.









Discussions arose during the presentation about how the different groups ranked / built the pyramid:

Article 28: Children have the right to education

- Everything is fine with the school, free school for everyone. In many countries, it is a problem for parents to be able to afford to send their children to school. There is bullying in school.
- Bullying exists against everyone not just immigrants.

Article 30: Children have the right to their language, their culture, and their religion

• Difficult to speak Swedish with friends who speak my mother tongue. It can be perceived as excluding. A teacher said that we are not allowed to speak our language at school and: "What if you say bad things about us Ålanders?"

Article 29: School must help the child to develop and teach the child about human rights

• We do not talk much about what it is like to be an immigrant in school. For me it is very important, and I would love to do it.

Article 12: Children have the right to express their opinions

- I do not know what it is like for Ålanders, but I have a hard time saying things to my parents. The respect for the parents is great. They are stricter towards girls.
- There is a lot to say but not everyone dares.
- Children can affect many things but not as much as adults.

Article 14: Children have the right to practice whatever religion they want, or none at all

 There are not many different types of churches here. School has a lot of focus on Christianity. Very Christian. Like everyone SHOULD be confirmed in church. Expectations in society - everyone asks: Have you been confirmed? Are you going to be confirmed?

Article 22: Children who are refugees have the right to protection and assistance and Article 27: Children have the right to a reasonable standard of living, such as housing, clothing, and food.

- Åland handles this well. Provides food to those who need it, such as the Food Bank.
- The municipality helps and the employment office provides support.

Did you get a lot of help at school?

- In the language course, we young people read Swedish together with older people. We thought it was strange to gather everyone who could not speak Swedish. We got to do a few other things and look around the city. Courses with music, art and sports.
- I got my own teacher in English. Those who studied Swedish as a second language got own teachers.
- I got help with the language. When I moved here, I had to rehearse year 7 (first year 7 in my home country and then year 7 on Åland).
- Mathematics is easier on Åland than, for example, in my home country. It is easier here with other subjects that are not language subjects.
- The teacher who taught us Swedish (Swedish for immigrants), she helps us. She knows everything and she can talk to us, she's like our mother. I do not really know what it is that makes her able, but she has taken many courses and learned. Once, all teachers had the opportunity to take a course in Sweden for teachers to learn about teaching to immigrants. From my school, only two teachers went she and another teacher.
- In the vocational upper secondary school, there is not the same support as in middle school when it comes to support for the language. Not everyone understands that you need help. Here there is only one teacher who can help.
- There are many who do not understand what it is like to move here and cope, not knowing the language, and understand things that you knew previously in your home country. I do not know what can be done to increase that understanding.

Have you experienced some kind of racism?

- There are many who do not understand what it is like to move here, not knowing the language.
- Yes, yes. There were many who were from other countries in my class. Others joked about our country.
- In my class, there are some "real Ålanders" who joke about my country.
- A guy in the class asked me "Do you know how to fit in? Well move away from here."
- The class has a group on Snapchat and there they send memes with stupid posts.
- Immigrants in general experience this "joking".
- People from the Middle East are equal to terrorist like.
- One thing I dislike is if an Ålander has heard rumours about, for example, a Romanian, then everyone thinks that it applies to all Romanians.
- When we fled our country and came here, we were called terrorists. We fled here to get away from terrorists.
- I think they only believe in things they see on TV.
- After 9.11 very bad for people from the Middle East.
- One thing I have heard is that Strandnäs school is called a ghetto because there are many immigrants there. I reply by asking: What do you mean?

Is there anything you can say or do so that this changes?

- In my class we have said that it is not fun. Even the teacher. But they do not listen. It is difficult. They kind of refuse to listen.
- In my class there has been a kind of quarrel. We went to the class teacher, and he talked to them. Then they became angrier with us, and it led to more racism.
- The same for me. It only got worse. The desire was to be treated like everyone else, but it only got worse.
- When a child was new, they disliked him a lot. He could not speak English or Swedish. He could not answer and then it just made him even more vulnerable.

What can teachers do?

- It is difficult. What can they do?
- They can explain how the students can do and be towards the new student so that they understand why a person is moving.
- Teachers and adults think better than children. They do not behave racist against children. Children cannot understand what it was like to move and start over. What is it like to go to a shop where someone speaks Swedish? And I would like to speak my language or meet an acquaintance. Then when you try to speak Swedish, you will be corrected in a bad way. I want to be corrected to be able to learn the mg language, but not laughed at.
- In vocational high school, everyone was more open than in middle school and I could start speaking more Swedish.
- The mother tongue is important to be able to talk to people in their country.
- I want classes where we talk about what it is like to be an immigrant. No one has asked me what it is like to have moved here. No one has asked me. I would like, for example, a substitute teacher to ask the question of what it was like to move here.

When you try to speak Swedish, you are corrected in a bad way. I want to be corrected to be able to learn the language, but not laughed at.

I want classes where we talk about what it is like to be an immigrant.

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Was it easy to become accepted in the group? In school?

- It was hard. I did not know English; I did not know Swedish so I could not say anything.
- At first, I did not know that I could speak English with the others, but then I realized that I could speak English. Then it went a little easier.
- We mixed languages, English, Swedish, the body everything.

Have you interpreted for your parents?

- Yes, in slightly different contexts.
- During a parent/teacher meeting at school, my father was asked if he wanted an interpreter with him, so he got to have an interpreter with him.
- A child has interpreted a few difficult words during a parent/teacher meeting.
- I interpret invoices for my parents.

Do you plan to stay on Åland?

- I would like to move to Sweden.
- Maybe when we get older.
- My parents are here to give me a better future. I wonder if they will stay on Åland.

Would you like to move back to your home country?

• Well... Different answers here. Some want to visit on holidays.

Remember!

- We all here are very smart because we know several languages. We know home languages (love my home country and I want everyone to know that, and I am proud), Swedish and English, so many languages. It is a "point" that we have that not everyone has.
- One thing to remember. We learn several languages.

What can be improved on Åland?

- More people. There are not that many people on the streets. It feels a little strange. Even in the summer, there are a few people out. In Sweden, for example, there are people in the forest who you can ask if you get lost or so. Once I got lost and it took 30 minutes before I met someone to ask.
- Maybe more big stores (but there are no people).
- Trains that run around the whole of Åland.
- Youth evening for immigrants. Not just for kids, for adults as well. Parties that you have in your home country. In Sweden there are such parties.
- This racism thing is because people are unfamiliar. They wonder why they speak another language, other clothes, etc. It is about unfamiliarity. What can be done is that there will be more immigrants on Åland. Here, everyone knows each other. Everyone is related to each other. More immigrants in each class so you are used to it.
- There are few immigrants in the archipelago.
- People are so prejudiced. It would be a good thing to take up this in schools, like working against stereotypes, not judging so much.
- I feel good when I hang out with people from other countries because then I will not be judged. Yes, when we hang out with other cultures, we talk about things we celebrate, things we have in common with food and music.
- There is a reluctance to new things. Example: Helicopter flights in the summer.
- For me, it's always fun to talk to people from other countries. How has it been for me here and what could society do?
- Maybe it's difficult with the law. When we moved here, we did not know the law. If we did something wrong, people call the town's housing company.
- Legislation is not taken up in school, I have learned it from my parents.
- It is more difficult for adults to learn the language. I have heard from my father that he is questioned when people ask: "why can you not speak the language better?". There are many who do not understand that it is more difficult the older you are. Many say that "Now you have come to Åland so now YOU should be able to speak Swedish."
- There ought to be Swedish lessons or special Swedish as a second language class for immigrants who go to high school
- Schools should offer more training, invest mostly in upper secondary school
- Camps for immigrants would be great. Like, get to know Åland by surviving!
- Camps for only immigrants means that you can talk about difficulties in coming here. They have a hard time understanding that it was a problem to move here. In Sweden, there is a university in Kristianstad for only immigrants.
- When I was a little and moved here, someone said that there are many different camps and so on. I did not want to attend camps with Ålanders as a child. I have no one to join, I will not understand.
- I want to read my mother tongue, but that possibility is lacking. It is difficult.
- In Sweden, there are immigrant teachers, immigrant youth leaders.
- Everyone recommended us to study to become assistant nurses. What do they think of us? That we can't do better? I want to study at a university. This means that people move on to the mainland.
- The way to be friends is different. After we've met four times we're kind of friends. BUT here, even if you have met 100 times, it is still distance.
- We are different when we play. We talk loudly and they think we are arguing. We have a wedding for three days, a bit like here, but bigger.
- Here you work early and then manage yourself after 18 years.
- For example, Christmas is so nice in my home country. I miss the way to celebrate holidays. It would be fun to do this on Aland.

3. Children with separated parents

Introduction

We asked 64 children with divorced parents: Has your parents' separation affected how you feel? We who asked are young people themselves with divorced parents. The survey was part of our summer job at Save the Children Åland in 2020.

We chose the theme and approach ourselves. We decided to do a survey aimed at children between 13 and 20 years and then create some spicy posters that were to be available where children are. The questionnaire was distributed on social media and some schools on Åland. We received a total of 64 responses.

We have also talked to friends, other children with separated parents, separated adults who have children and professionals. In general, children are well because they have access to a good standard of living such as food, house and usually love. What is needed more is a large amount of information at the actual separation and the time after for the children. Another shortcoming is that children are not always allowed to be heard on issues that concern them. Article 12 of the Convention on the Rights of the Child states: "Children have the right to express their opinion and to be heard in all matters concerning the child." This is something that Åland must work on. We also think it is needed several people on Åland who are available all the time, that children can talk to because there is a shortage of such. Maybe a support person or someone trained?

Remember!

- You're not alone
- You always have the right to talk to someone if you feel sad, e.g. a school health nurse, Folkhälsan (Public Health Association) or Save the Children
- It is not your fault that you are in this situation
- It is not your patents who decide what is a secret
- If the parents have any questions about the ex-partner, they should talk to each other, not to you
- There are many children who get / have a stomach-ache when they change parents / residences
- It is important that you are allowed to tell what you think is right, even if it does not happen
- There are both good and bad things about having a bonus family
- Do not worry about money, it is ALWAYS the adults who will take care of it
- It will be OK <3


What is needed more for the children is a large amount of information at the time of the actual separation and the time after.


How old are you?

64 youths answered this question.




How old were you when your parents separated/divorced?

Can your parents cooperate well?


64 youths answered this question.

64 youths answered this question. All were allowed to select as many alternatives as they liked.



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

Which grown-up talked to you?


26 youths answered this question. All were allowed to write freely.

Do you have any tips on how it could be better for children on Åland with divorced parents? What would you have needed?

- Do not say bad things about each other in front of the children
- Prioritize the children in the first place. Cooperate. Let them speak. Show that you are there for each other
- Spend some time with the "old" family mix, such as a holiday, even if the adults hate each other
- Clarity between both separate families
- Another adult to talk to



- Therapy
- A support person
- Somebody who could explain better what is going on.


- Talk to someone you can trust.
- That the parents talk to the children and that the children ask if they have any questions.
- Some kind of organisation that could have helped, without costing so damn much money because that's where the problem lies.
- A survey for parents who die when they are young, my father died, they never divorced. Count me out of the answers to this questionnaire if you will, but I think it is more traumatic to lose a parent in a death than in a divorce, after all, I can never see my father again. Yet it is always only about divorced parents that people talk and care about. I still feel very bad to this day, even though it's been 11 years since he died this year. It's a permanent life change for the worse, especially when they die suddenly. I was not even allowed to start school before I got lost a parent. Still, people just feel sorry for those who can meet both parents and have a steady income from both. Correct me if I'm wrong, I can accept it. So far, all the support for children who lost a parent in childhood has passed me by. Take care.

Someone, an outsider, who explains a little more, like why it happened, what it will be like, and so on.



Do you have any tips on how it could be better for children on Åland with divorced parents? What would you have needed?

- A person to talk to
- That my parents listen, and then money
- Support, someone who cares
- That you still have both parents who are in your life and contact you if you are, for example, every other week or so, etc
- I would have needed information from my parents why it happened. I lived for a long time with the feeling that they divorced unnecessarily and that it only affected me, without the need for them to divorce. I wish I had been told, when I got older that it was the best thing they could do
- Okay, buy a nice moped for them
- I know that some of my friends who have divorced parents have problems with finances. And I know that they would appreciate if some activities were free or cheaper. I would not have needed it as I already go to floorball.





School transport from both parents' homes, even if they live in different municipalities. When the school receives information that the parents are separating, via, for example, a change of address in contact information, a mandatory meeting / contact information should be introduced for the guardian of the child. And follow-up after 6 months / 1 year, when the child may be more receptive. Also, that schools receive information about how ugly a divorce can go and how long it can continue to be ugly. I experience that especially teachers on Aland are usually very ignorant. That the children in some way would receive information about their rights, such as choosing who to live with after x age and where to turn if those rights are not fulfilled. That papers for instance, that require both parents' signatures must have a submission period of at least 1.5 weeks, so that a change has time to take place and the child avoids the stress that may arise from having to contact the parent with whom it is not "with".
